

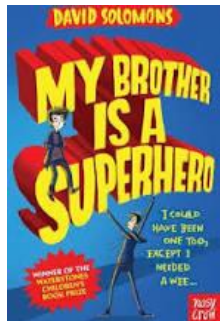

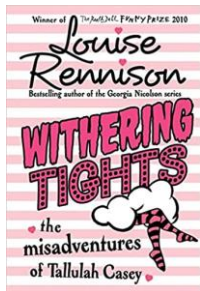

Withering Tights by Louise Rennison 12+

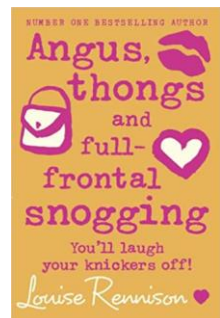

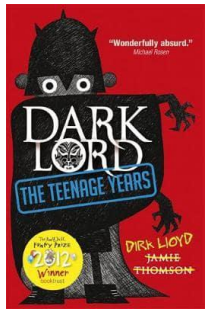

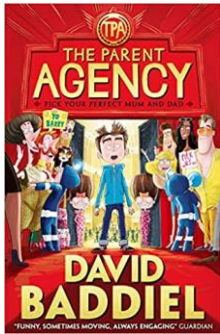




Darklord: The teenage years by Jamie Thompson.

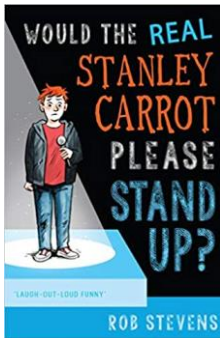

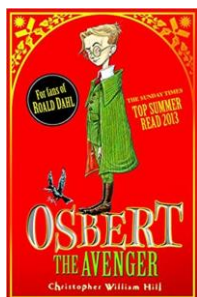
The Parent Agency by David Baddiel

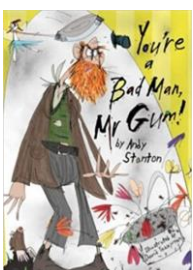
Would the real Stanley Carrot please stand up, by Rob Stevens.

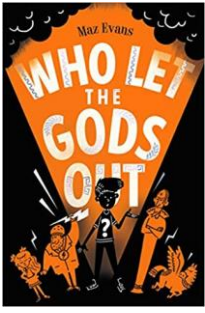

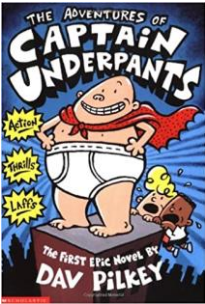

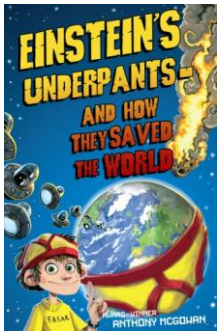

The Adventures of Captain Underpants by Dav Pilkey

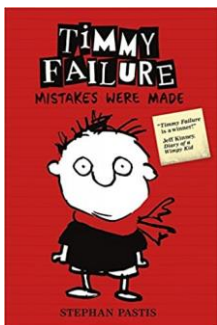

Einstein's Underpants and how they saved the world by Anthony McGowan.

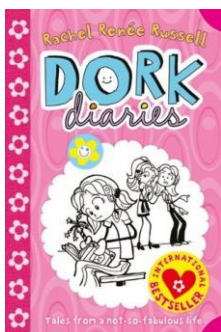

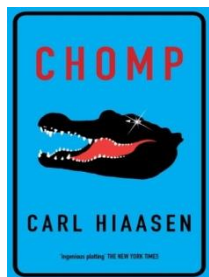
Pants are everything by Mark Lowery.

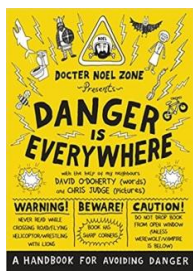
Flush by Carl Hiaasen.

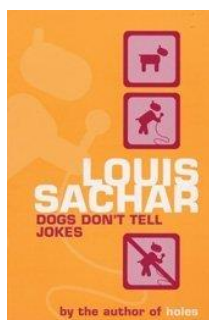
Chomp by Carl Hiaasen

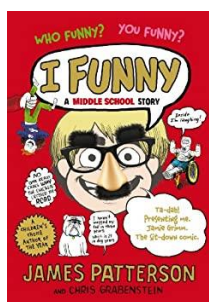
Danger is everywhere. A handbook for avoiding Danger by Brian Fenton.

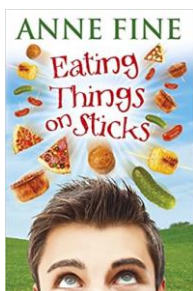
Dogs don't tell jokes by Lois Sachar

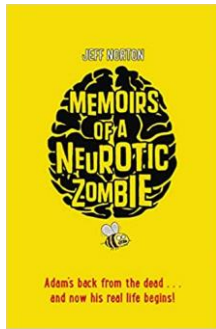
I, Funny by James Patterson.

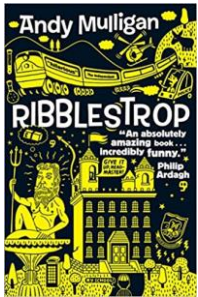
Eating things on sticks by Anne Fine

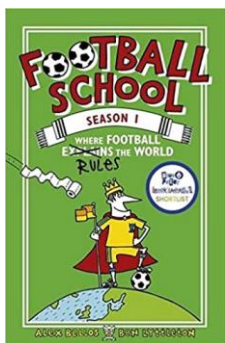
Ribblestrop by Andy Mulligan

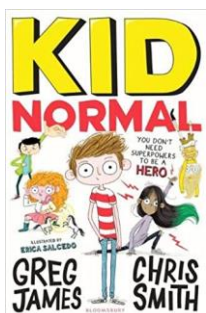
Girl out of water by Nat Luurtsema 12+

Football school by Alex Bellos and Ben Lyttleton

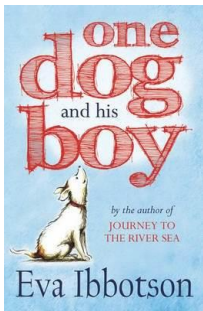

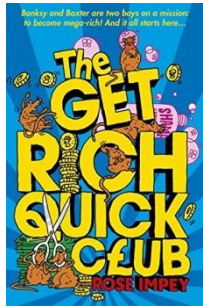

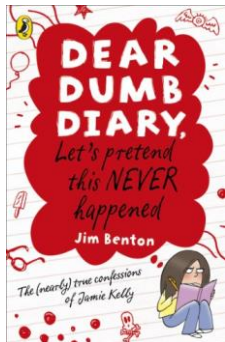
One Dog and his boy by Eva Ibbotson.

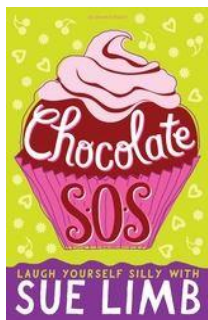

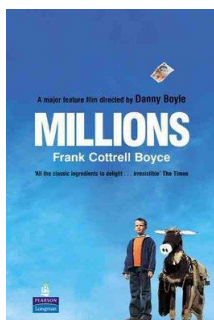

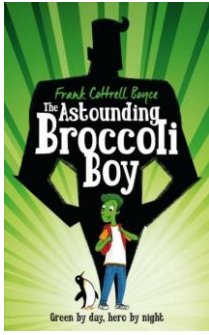
Chocolate SOS by Sue Limb

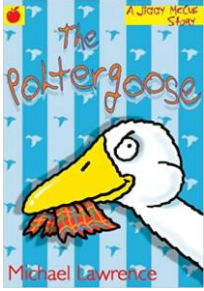
Millions by Frank Cottrell Boyce.

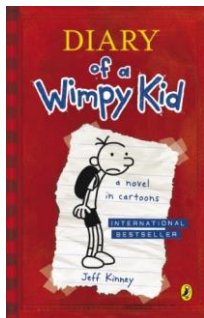

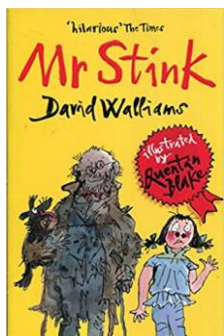

The Diary of a Wimpy Kid by Jeff Kinney

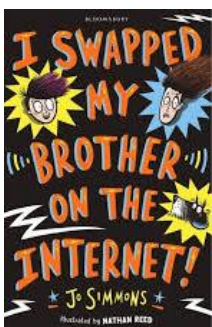

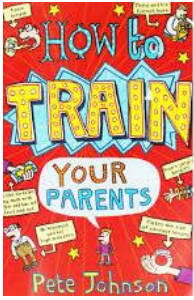
Mr Stink by David Walliams

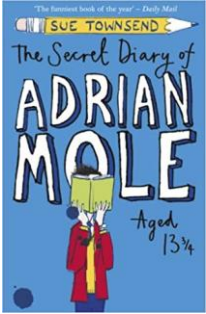
I swapped my brother on the internet by Jo Simmons

How to train your parents by Pete Johnson

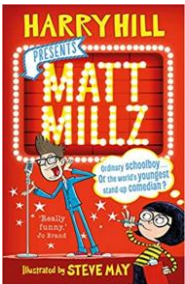
