



Beast by Ally Kennion.




A wrinkle in time by Madeleine L'Engle.

Wayne Rooney by Tom and Matt Oldfield.



One of nearly 50 football books including the likes of Bale, Hazard, Salah and Messi.




Beast Hunter by Kathryn White.


Bad Girls by Jacqueline Wilson.


The butterfly Club by Jacqueline Wilson.

The Ghost box by Catherine Fisher.





Thief by Malorie Blackman. 12+




The Vampire of Croglin by Terry Deary.

Ottoline and the yellow cat by Chris Riddell.




Diary of an Unteenager by Pete Johnson. 12+

How to rob a bank by Tom Mitchell.



The world of Norm: May contain nuts by Johathan Meres.




Billionaire boy by David Walliams.

The front room by Michelle Magorian. 12+






